Loving Your Home: Part of Being a Good Neighbor

One of the things that makes Southern Gables such a great place is the way people take care of their homes and keep the neighborhood looking attractive. When we have interviewed residents on what attracted them to move here in the first place, that factor has often been mentioned near the top of the list. Whether you are one of the original residents or a new one, you need to regularly maintain your home to keep it in good shape. Overlooking repairs and updates could squeeze you into losing both function and value. It's never too late to get yourself into a good pattern of regular maintenance for your home. Taking care of business on an ongoing basis will serve you well in the long run.

Look With Intention and Make a Plan

Commit to doing a comprehensive home inspection in the early spring and one in the fall. Mark the dates on your calendar and stick to them. Start with the exterior looking for wear, peeling, and incipient water damage Then, on the interior, you have to try to "see with new eyes." After all, you have looked at the walls and doorframes every day without seeing the smudges and scratches that build up unnoticed. Cracked wall plates, squeaky doors? Make a list.

First Line of Defense: The Exterior

Starting with the most obvious, your roof, gutters, downspouts, and siding are the home's armor. Look for loose or damaged fittings and attachments, and inspect for debris in the gutters. Check downspouts for erosion at the base. Check for damage that could let pests in, such as holes in your window screens or siding. Schedule or do repairs right away. If you see evidence of wood-eating pests, you may need to call a professional.

For your paved surfaces, use a concrete or asphalt patch product to fix cracks and breaks before they grow to be bigger problems. If you have paths or patios made of pavers, it should be kept weed-free and you can use sand in the spaces between the stones. Wood decks need to have stain reapplied every two to three years to prevent water from working its way in.

Check the Essentials

Your home has to manage a complex equation to balance hot and cold air, clean and used water, and air quality. It coordinates the use of machines, ducts, burners, pipes, and filters that are in your care. Switch out your air filters quarterly, and have professional inspection of your heater and air conditioner annually. It doesn't take a professional to look for leaks, but it takes an intentional, serious inspection. Small leaks can do either of two things: cause severe damage over a long period of time, or lead to a sudden failure that causes a lot of damage in no time at all. Windows need special attention too; if they leak air in extreme temperatures, or water when the rains come, you've got more than pennies slipping through the gaps. Inspect windows and sills from both inside and outside.

The Interior

Keeping your home clean is something you might do without thinking. Just routine stuff – wipe the counters, vacuum, pick up and dust. Nothing to worry about, right? Maybe that mundane duty needs more attention. Moisture and grease droplets from cooking drift throughout the house and the effects are insidious. Wipe down kitchen cabinets periodically with hot soapy water or a grease-cutting cleaner. Scrub showers and tubs regularly to prevent mold buildup. If you find moldy caulk, cut it out and replace it with new. Regular cleaning is beneficial to your appliances too. Go over the inside and outside of your washer, dryer, refrigerator, and dishwasher to remove dirt and grease.

If you use your fireplace frequently, get it inspected and cleaned professionally every year before the first use of the season. That can be every few years instead of annually if you seldom use it, but recognize that creosote buildup is a fire hazard. On the subject of fire hazards, in most homes the fire and carbon monoxide detectors are not given their proper respect. They should be tested monthly by pressing their test buttons. If your alarms use batteries, swap out the old ones for fresh batteries once a year. A chirping sound means it's time to change batteries. Alarm sensors wear out, necessitating the replacement of the alarm unit every 10 years. Some alarms have a distinctive sound that indicates the end-of-life of the unit, but many don't.

It takes attention and care, but it's a job everyone can do and it has a great long-term payoff. With systematic care, you and your family will enjoy a comfortable and secure home for many years to come.

Lakewood Does Leaves!

No dumpsters for Southern Gables leaf collection this year: Lakewood steps up!

The City of Lakewood seems to like what we do in Southern Gables. We've always thought imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. For a few years now, the Southern Gables Neighborhood Association has conducted a leaf collection project in the fall to keep leaves from going to waste and clogging up landfills. This year the City will do the same – and they're doing it up big!

A whole week for leaf collection! Lakewood will be accepting leaves from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM starting Saturday November 4, skip Sunday, and then Monday Nov 6 through Saturday Nov 11. Take your leaves to the City Greenhouse, 9556 W. Yale Ave., Lakewood, CO 80227. It's "right around the corner" from Southern Gables!

Special Service for Elderly and Disabled. In addition to accepting leaves from neighbors who bring them, in past years our Neighborhood Association project has included raking by students from Denver Christian School for our residents who are elderly or disabled. We are keeping this service the same. To sign up yourself or recommend a neighbor for leaf raking under this program, contact Judy Whitten, 303-986-7157 or jewhitten@comcast.net.

All of our other Southern Gables residents can bring leaves to the Yale Ave. facility. The leaves will be put to good use instead of going to waste. This will benefit the environment and save space in landfills. Important rules:

- Lakewood residents only. Proof may be required.
- This event is for **leaves only**. No branches, woody brush or tree stumps. Jefferson County offers slash collection. Visit <u>Jeffco.US/Slash</u> and sign up for location alerts.
- No commercial businesses.
- All leaves must be emptied on the pile. No bags, even if they are compostable bags, can be accepted.

Remember too: it's against the law to sweep or blow leaves into the street. Piles of leaves clog the storm drain system and damage street sweepers. We all benefit by keeping our Lakewood streets clean.

Another Thing About Those Leaves

Our friends at Sustainable Southern Gables tell us that a great option is to "leave the leaves" by raking them into your garden or perennial beds.
